Supply List for WaterColor Strips Quilt

The objective of this class is to learn the WaterColor technique. A waterColor quilt blends together using floral fabric prints. How well a quilt blends depends on the tonal value of your fabrics (light, medium, and dark). This quilt is for a confident beginner.

I call it watercolor because if you use floral prints, the stripes blend together to give a watercolor effect. You might have seen or made a watercolor quilt with 2" squares. What we are working with is using the value of light, medium and dark fabrics. I have used solid fabrics (not floral) and it gives more of a contrast to your piece. You can use several light, medium and dark fabrics or just use three fabrics, plus a border or focus fabric for the boarders.

The quilt below is 62" x 62" and it uses only three fabrics plus the border.

| Dark background fabric | 2 yards | For borders | 1 piece |
| Binding (2 ¹ / ₂ ") | ³ ⁄ ₄ yard | Binding | 1 piece |

Supplies

Basic sewing machine supplies

Spray sizing, spray on fabric before cutting into strips.

12 1/2 " plastic square ruler for cutting

Sharp scissors, pencil and pins

Sewing machine with an accurate 1/4" sewing foot for accurately piecing the strips.

Thread, rulers, rotary cuter, and an iron.

Flannel sheet or the back of a plastic tablecloth for design board.
